Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the NCCD. The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.
- This information assists schools to:
- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. If you have any questions about the NCCD, please contact the school.

The Welcome pays respect to the traditional custodians, ancestors and continuing cultural, spiritual and religious practices of Ballardong Noongar people. Our students listened to traditional songs (performed by Clive and Donald Smith), learnt some Noongar language and heard some childhood stories from Nan Charlotte and Nan Carol. The students then took this learning in to their classes where they did some follow up NAIDOC activities.

















YIRRA YAAKIN THEATRE COMPANY INCURSION

We welcomed the Yirra Kaakin Theatre Company to school to present their performance *Bilya Kaatijin*. Bilya Kaatijin, meaning 'fresh water knowledge' connects stories from Noongar land to Wonguktha land, Aotearoa and the Kikuyu people of Kenya. Bilya Kaatijin taught the students about the importance of water to the First Nations people around the world. The students were led on a journey through global Dreaming stories learnt about the importance of accepting others, the power of empathy and the impact of climate change to the land and the Noongar seasons.
